THE EXPOSITORY ESSAY

An expository essay is a common essay style; it is developed by definition, descriptions, narration, examples, facts, and incidents. An expository essay combines several techniques used in other types of essays and can be compared with a discussion.

An expository essay does not necessarily contain a definite stand; the writer analyzes the entire issue. Sometimes the writer presents his/her own ideas and lets readers form their own opinions; other times, the writer comes to a careful conclusion after considering all aspects of the topic. Thus, the writer of an expository essay does not write with the purpose of convincing the reader but with the idea of informing him.

Transitions should be used when one writes an expository essay. The following are frequently used transitions:
